Luke 12:49-56 *“Do you think I have come to bring peace to the earth? No, I have come to divide people against each other! From now on families will be split apart, three in favor of me, and two against—or two in favor and three against.”* (vv.52-53 NLT)

Jesus was always honest and forth right in his answers and opinions, and he was in this difficult situation. He was facing a terrible baptism of suffering—death on the cross! He was totally God, but also human while on earth. He knew his death would divide people.

The main suffering, I believe, was the separation of people by how we choose—God’s loving ways or our own way! God gives us the gift of choice, not forcing us to believe in him.

I think of choice in my daily living, and the choices I have made and continue to make, good and bad. Often I choose thinking what seems right to me. I am not the author of right choice. In Deuteronomy 30:19 the Israelites are told, “Oh, that you would choose life. So that you and your descendants might live.” How? By making the best choices, to walk a life of loving the Lord, your God! This is the key to your life, and mine.

Matthew 21:1-11 *"Tell the people of Jerusalem, 'Look, your King is coming to you. He is humble, riding on a donkey—riding on a donkey's colt'"* (v.5)

In ministry we learned the great commission—to go and make disciples of all nations. Howard heard that call and followed it with all his heart. I followed Howard in the beginning, but learned quickly that ministry would be easier if I were more willing. Howard encouraging me saying, "Barbara you can do this.
