Sunday, June 26

Numbers 21:4-9, 21-35 *But the people grew impatient on the way; they spoke against God* (vv.4b, 5a NIV)

My grandson is just shy of being two years old. On Mondays and Tuesdays, he eats dinner with us. He likes to be in the kitchen where the activity and cooking is taking place. He understands that dinner is imminent and will be on the table soon.

However, he gets impatient when the food takes longer than he wants it to. He pulls his special chair out and tries to climb into it by himself. Then he puts his bib on, thinking it is time to eat. He is most often ready to eat before the food is. Then he begins to cry and say please, thinking this will help the food come faster.

Have you ever become impatient with God about something you think should happen sooner? Maybe you are waiting for God to answer a prayer. Perhaps you are waiting on God to do something sooner rather than on His schedule.

May we not be like the Israelites and end up speaking against God in our impatience. Let us wait upon God for His timing.

Romans 6:12-23 *Therefore do not let sin reign in your mortal body so that you obey its evil desires. Do not offer any part of yourself to sin as an instrument of wickedness, but rather offer yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life; and offer every part of yourself to him as an instrument of righteousness. For sin shall not be your master, because you are not under the law, but under grace.* (vv.12-14)

Romans 7:13-25 *What a wretched man I am! Who will rescue me from this body that is subject to death? Thanks be to God, who delivers me through Jesus Christ our Lord.* (vv.24-25)

Before I knew Jesus Christ as my Lord and Savior, my life was a mess. I struggled with addictions and unhealthy habits and was hanging out with the “wrong” crowd. I knew my life needed changing but I didn't know how or what would help me change. I felt like Paul in these verses above. God knew I needed a

personal relationship with Him in order to change. Some people had spoken to me about Christ here and there, but it didn't really make sense to me at that point.

One day, I went to a church service with my mom. The pastor gave a message about receiving Christ and being forgiven and changed because of his power. Even though I didn't understand everything he was saying, I knew God could help me change. I was rescued and saved from my old way of life into a new relationship with Christ! Matthew 22:1-14 *“But they paid no attention and went off—one to his field, another to his business.”* (v.5)

I am a God follower, a believer in Jesus Christ. When I read this parable about the banquet, God reminded me that sometimes my busy-ness can get in the way of following Him.

I tend to think of my time as my own—not God's. Sometimes, God wants me to do something or minister to someone that will take time. I can rebel and stomp my feet like a little child, complaining I don't have enough time. I have other things to do—like babysit my grandson or go to Bible study. Both of these things are good things, but maybe not what God wants of me on that day.

God wants me to pay attention to what He is saying to me—not merely go off doing my own thing every day. This is a caution to all of us. We need to listen and obey and pay attention to the promptings of God. May God be pleased the next time he taps me on the shoulder and finds I am listening. He who has ears to hear, let him hear.

Matthew 22:15-22 *Then he said to them, "So give back to Caesar what is Caesar's, and to God what is God's."* (v.21b)

Jesus never shied away from talking about money. In fact, Jesus taught a lot about money in the New Testament. Most people are uncomfortable about discussing money and financial matters. Tithing can be a sensitive subject too.

Here, in this parable, Jesus instructs us to pay attention to both earthly matters and heavenly matters. Sometimes the two intertwine, like tithing and paying taxes. God's desire is for me to do both. I need to give God what He is due and also pay taxes.

But this parable is not just about money. It is also about giving God our spiritual worship and using the gifts He has given us. We are encouraged to pay attention to money matters and to spiritual matters. Sometimes they are separate and sometimes they are not. May God give us wisdom to know the difference and take care of both when we need to.
