Psalm 63 Oh God, you are my God; I earnestly search for you. My soul thirsts for you; my whole body longs for you in this parched and weary land where there is no water. You satisfy me more than the richest feast. I will praise you with songs of joy. (vv.1, 5 NLT)

Physical hunger and thirst are needs humans can't ignore. We can satisfy those needs with bread and water. Yuck! I'd much rather have a feast. When I think of a feast, I think of delicious, abundant food that goes beyond just filling my empty stomach. Also, feasting is not just about the food served, it's about the fellowship that takes place as well. Consider this analogy in our relationship with God. Esther 4:1-17 "Who knows that perhaps you were made queen for just such a time as this?" (v.14b)

God positioned Esther as queen so that he could use her position to save his chosen people, the Jews. God also positioned Mordecai, Esther's uncle and surrogate father, to teach her God's truth and remind her of her identity and calling. God could have used anyone or any means to save his people from Haman's evil schemes, but he gave Esther and Mordecai the opportunity to be part of his plan.

Luke 11:27-36 "No one lights a lamp and then hides it or puts it under a basket. Instead a lamp is placed on a stand, where its light can be seen by all who enter the house." (v.33)

I happen to have a red letter Bible (Jesus' words are written in red ink) and it always brings such emphasis to Jesus' character! His words are often confrontational and cause me to examine myself at deeper levels than are comfortable. Who is the Light? Jesus is, of course, so allow me to re-phrase. No one declares Jesus is Lord of her life and keeps it a secret. Now sometimes that can be uncomfortable! It is never too late for him to heal me, even from wounding experiences from my childhood that continue to affect my behavior in the present.

Ezekiel 20:1-17 "But the people of Israel rebelled against me, and they refused to obey my decrees there in the wilderness. They wouldn't obey my regulations even though obedience would have given them life." (v.13a)

This passage is preceded by God telling his people through Ezekiel, "How dare you come to me for a message when you are still worshipping your idols."

Why wouldn't they obey God? Because they preferred to do things their own way. Does that sound familiar? Instead of trusting the God who had rescued them, they worshipped things they had made.
