## Sunday, November 20

Zechariah 9:9-16 Rejoice greatly, Daughter Zion! Shout, Daughter Jerusalem! See your king comes to you, righteous and victorious, lowly and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey. (v.9 NIV)

When my children were little, they had a small nativity set made out of brightly colored rubber. The set even included some animals. Sometimes they would take the baby Jesus figure and put it on top of the donkey, pretending that Jesus was riding on the donkey. They would pretend with the other figures too like Mary and Joseph and the wise men as well.

Psalm 119:145-176 My eyes stay open through the watches of the night, that I may meditate on your promises. (v.148)

Then it seems I often wake up in the middle of the night as well. It's easy to toss and turn and think of nothing but getting back to sleep.

Luke 19:28-40 As he approached Jerusalem and saw the city, he wept over it. (v.41)

Jesus was fully man and fully God. One of the things that comforts me most about Jesus is knowing he had emotions. In this passage we see him weeping over Jerusalem.

Although Scripture doesn't tell us explicitly, I am sure Jesus laughed too. In the garden we see him struggle with going to the cross. So much so, that he sweat drops of blood. Philippians 2:1-11 Rather, he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. (v.7)

These verses remind me of chapter 13 of John, when Jesus washes the disciples' feet. I am always amazed at how humble Jesus was to do this. He took the lowliest duty of a servant to show his love and care for the disciples.

I am also struck by the fact that Jesus knew even then that Judas was his betrayer. Yet Jesus still chose to wash the betrayer's feet. He did this to show he was a servant of all mankind—that he would suffer and die for all, not just the good people or good disciples.

That Jesus set aside his glory to be both human and a servant is beyond understanding. I am so thankful God humbled Himself on my behalf to save me from sin.
