Sunday, December 4

Isaiah 5:1-7 My beloved has a vineyard on a very fruitful hill. He dug it up and cleared out its stones, and planted it with the choicest vine. He built a tower in its midst, and also made a winepress in it; so He expected it to bring forth good grapes, but it brought forth wild grapes. (vv.1b-2 NKJV)

God is a vineyard owner, and also a master gardener who puts real muscle into His work. I can *feel* His sadness and disappointment. Having done everything possible to produce a good crop of grapes, what more could He have done? Well, how about sending us a Savior to atone for all our stupidities and waywardness?

Psalm 25 Show me Your ways, O LORD; teach me Your paths. Lead me in Your truth and teach me, for You are the God of my salvation; on You I wait all the day. (vv.4-5)

These words wash over my soul like clear, clean water from the fountain of life. They beckon me to a simpler way, a trusting way to live life. Some years ago my eldest son and his wife wrote a song together. The refrain goes like this: "Here we are, Lord—children at your feet, ready to do your will." There is a sense of surrender here, of the kind that transforms us into teachable and malleable people. We learn to wait on God all the day,

because we never know when He will open a new door, or show us a pressing need, or lead us to pray for someone far away. Our times are in God's hands and He is leading us along His paths one day at a time.

1 Thessalonians 5:12-28 Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, in everything give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. (vv.16-18)

Isaiah 6:1-13 In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lifted up, and the train of His robe filled the temple. (v.1)

Without a vision the people perish. Isaiah had one, and it was first of all humbling, later on empowering to his ministry. Visions though relatively rare are essential as God works out His will in human history. I have been blessed by two memorable visions in my life—both of them insights into God's purpose *for His people* in a particular place at a particular time. Both proved prophetic in that what was envisioned truly came about in real time. They prepared me for what lay ahead and gave me a fresh view of what was currently happening. *So...*I am a firm believer in the efficacy of visions.

They are one of the tools in God's tool-box as He builds His kingdom here on earth.

Thursday, December 8

Psalm 37:1-18 Trust in the LORD, and do good; dwell in the land, and feed on His faithfulness. Delight yourself also in the LORD, and He shall give you the desires of your heart. (vv.3-4)

These are rich verses which resonate deeply with me. Putting our trust in the Lord leads us into good doing. Dwelling in the land—the place God provides to nourish His people—enables us to feed on His faithfulness. For me this can be a Sunday Eucharist with the prescribed readings from God's Word, or an informal gathering of Christians "breaking the bread of life" together—in other words, feeding one another with God's faithfulness.

In this way our cups are being filled and we find ourselves delighting in the Lord. Songs of praise burst forth from a grateful heart. When our will is so closely attuned to God's our desires will be also.

Luke 22:14-30 He who is greatest among you, let him be as the younger, and he who governs as he who serves. For who is greater, he who sits at the table, or he who serves? Is it not he who sits at the table? Yet I am among you as the One who serves. (vv.26b-27)

A new opportunity for servanthood is opening up for me.
