Luke 3:7-18 *John said to the crowds coming out to be baptized by him, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath? Produce fruit in keeping with repentance."* (vv.7-8a NIV)

We are called to something deep within our heart. We are all called to bear fruit. Each does this, God willing, in our own time and our own sense of place with His help through the power of the Holy Spirit.

My wife is the manager of a garden center, and I am frequently over there for this or that. Over the last months I have watched wonderful fruit trees and berry bushes flowering out for Spring, and now there is fruit on the trees and bushes—fruit from plants in a container at the edge of open space next to the parking lot. Through her witness I came to realize that the difficult ones can be a messenger from God also. Be attentive and listen. God sends out messengers of love for you in many forms. They may be close by and they may be outside the circles you have created.

Matthew 5:38-48 *“But I tell you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be children of your Father in heaven. He causes his sun to rise on the evil and the good, and sends rain on the righteous and the unrighteous.”* (vv.44-45)

Jesus wept in Orlando recently. I wept also. Forty-nine lives lost, and the grief from families and friends was palatable. This act in the name of radical Islam still scars my heart. I asked myself, “Where was God in all of this?” I was asked to comfort and console a family of one of the victims in the process of planning his funeral at my church. Prayer, tears, grief and planning amidst a media circus looking for the next big thing and a small group of fundamental “Christian” protesters with signs of hate in their hands. In the midst of tears and stories, food and fellowship, Christ was there and held up in a demonstrative way to remind us that there is power and peace in the resurrection. There is hope, and life beyond this brief, transitory life. Love won, God won, and we are each changed as a result.

When I was ordained and placed in my first parish, I could not wait to get to work in God’s vineyard. I was asked to go and visit a parishioner in the hospital recovering from surgery. I was eager to put into practice the things I had learned in four years of schooling, and six months of fieldwork in a parish other than my own. On my very first visit to the hospital, I knocked on the door, entered, and spoke to the person. No response—just a blank stare. I asked several questions, moved closer. No response—just a blank stare. I did not know what to do. I said a brief prayer and walked out into the hall. I will never forget that day, some 12 years ago. The one thing that I failed to do, was take the time to offer a prayer for God’s help and wisdom before entering the room. Him not me, me, me. Turns out the patient had extensive brain surgery, and could not talk. God can use each of us in magnificent ways if we just take the time to pray, listen for His call, and get right with His will.

life. Paring down the possessions to a critical few opens a world of possibilities, and space to breathe, stretch, and give thanks for a life born anew in Christ.

If you are having trouble recognizing Jesus' real presence at this point in your life, there may be a real benefit in drawing from your memory; remembering moments in your life and see that they were a gift from a loving God who can guide you down the path of life into a new life in Him.
