Sunday, February 8

John 7:37-46 On the last and greatest day of the festival, Jesus stood and said in a loud voice, "Let anyone who is thirsty come to me and drink. Whoever believes in me, as Scripture has said, rivers of living water will flow from within them." (vv.37-38 NIV)

John's Gospel makes it clear that there was much division over who Jesus was. As he taught they sensed his authority, yet he had not been formally educated. He had wisdom beyond his years; some were in disbelief, others were amazed.

I have often struggled with the thought that, were I living in Jesus' time, would I have been a believer or one who doubted him? I tend to be skeptical of things that don't seem logical or make common sense. There's nothing logical or routine about Jesus' response in verse 16: "My teaching is not my own. It comes from the one who sent me."

Through my faith journey and life experience, I find comfort in the hope and possibility that the awe-inspiring, heart-tugging authenticity of Jesus' love would have drawn me close and touched my heart deeply so that I, too, would have said, "Truly, this is the Messiah, the Christ."

Monday, February 9

Isaiah 58:1-12 Is not this the kind of fasting I have chosen: to loose the chains of injustice and untie the cords of the yoke, to set the oppressed free and break every yoke?...you will be called Repairer of Broken Walls, Restorer of Streets with Dwellings. (vv.6, 12)

Relationships come in such a variety of flavors: spouses, parents, children, friends, colleagues, neighbors, employers, clients, and patients, to name a few. They can be positive and fulfilling or difficult, draining the joy from life. The tough ones are the challenge. Perhaps it might be a difficult patch in what has been an overall good relationship.

Forgiveness, I believe, is the key—both of others and of ourselves. Isaiah speaks of being set free, breaking the yoke and becoming "repairers" and "restorers" so "your healing will quickly appear" (v.8). The results are worth the effort: healing, peace of mind, joy, and freedom to love as God loves us.

Tuesday, February 10

Psalm 78:1-39 He rained down manna for the people to eat, he gave them the grain from heaven. Human beings ate the bread of angels; he sent them all the food they could eat. (vv.24-25)

In the Lord's Prayer we say, "Give us this day our daily bread..."—daily, enough for today, not enough for tomorrow, next week, or next year. So it was with Moses and the Israelites during their 40-year sojourn in the desert. God provided "bread from heaven" and they were told to gather "enough for that day." When some tried to hoard more, it spoiled and became inedible.

These words help me as I try to lean into them, trusting that God has and will continue to provide enough for my needs. It's easy to worry, to fear the future, wondering if I will have enough to take care of myself, a single woman who has a history of longevity in her genes.

By focusing on today, working hard, and giving thanks for God's love and provision, I can trust that He is in control and will provide. He will guide me to use the gifts He has provided; He will continue to love me for He wants the best for me, and all His children. It's not about stockpiling material wealth but having enough and knowing Whom to thank.

Isaiah 59:15b-21 "As for me, this is my covenant with them" says the LORD. "My Spirit, who is on you, will not depart from you, and my words that I have put in your mouth will always be on your lips, on the lips of your children, and on the lips of their descendants—from this time on and forever," says the LORD. (v.21)

"My Spirit, who is on you, will not depart from you..."— what comforting words for me but especially for those whom I love. Having grown children who lead independent lives and grandchildren who live several states away, I pray for God's protection and blessing on them every day.

Isaiah's words echo those in the service of Holy Baptism spoken as the priest marks the head of the newly baptized with the sign of the cross, saying, "You are sealed by the Holy Spirit in Baptism and marked as Christ's own forever." Forever...Christ's own, forever! I treasure these words and claim them knowing that my loved ones belong to our loving God. Our children are not our possessions but rather are gifts from God entrusted to us to be loved, guided, and nurtured. They have the sign of the Cross indelibly marked on their foreheads and, as much as I love them, I know that God loves them even more. Thank You, Lord.
