Joshua 1:1-18 "Do not be frightened and do not be dismayed, for the LORD your God is with you wherever you go." (v.9c ESV)

Joshua 2:1-14 Now then, please swear to me by the LORD that, as I have dealt kindly with you, you also will deal kindly with my father's house... (v.12)

How do we determine whom to trust and whom not to trust? Looking back on those high school years full of insecurities, I remember several times when I shared some secret "stuff" with a "trusted friend."

I believed the information I shared would be safe, but I was wrong. It was passed along. Looking back, the tidbits were silly matters of no importance. But I was devastated because the bond of trust was broken. So who do you trust? In our passage for the day the scouts trusted in the woman of Jericho to hide them and

keep them safe. In turn, she trusted them to fulfill their promise to protect her and her family when the armies attacked. Because she knew they were doing God's work and she feared God, she knew her request would be honored. We are taught to trust in the Lord and he will deal kindly with us.

Joshua 3:14—4:7 "Take twelve men from the people, from each tribe a man, and command them, saying, 'Take twelve stones from here out of the midst of the Jordan, from the very place where the priests' feet stood firmly, and bring them over with you and lay them down in the place where you lodge tonight.'" (vv.2-3)

How much symbolism in this passage! To build anything, we need to start at the base and provide a firm foundation. Whether it is a new building or a new relationship, the strength of the structure is a firm base. A perfect example is a mission church where a handful of families with much faith form the bedrock for the growth of a thriving parish. In our reading the twelve stones, one from each tribe, are the bedrock of the new nation in the Promised Land. Only a miracle by God, holding back the waters, exposed those stones. Today's reading in Romans gives our blueprint for life. It spells out our daily guide for living. I am especially drawn to these two verses as they are fulfilled in two of our parish's outreach ministries. Each Sunday our liturgy is enhanced with floral arrangements near the altar. Those blessed flowers that are then used to create individual floral arrangements which are delivered to those who are sick or not able to attend services. A sunny arrangement and a visit from a saint brighten everyone's day. And monthly, food is delivered to the needy by a small army of saints to provide for their sustenance. Psalm 32 I will instruct you and teach you in the way you should go; I will counsel you with my eye on you. (v.8)

Who was your very best teacher? I am sure that you can vividly share a story or two about classroom teachers who imprinted valuable lessons on your life. It may have been your mother or father or a school teacher whose guidance led you to the love of a sport or hobby or how to treat others. I reflect back on lessons I learned as child from my mother. She never hesitated to include me when preparing meals, cleaning the house, or sewing an outfit. The best lessons she taught actually revealed themselves to me later in life. She was patient and forgiving. She never spoke ill of anyone. She was a good friend, visiting folks who lived nearby and keeping in touch by long personal letters to friends who lived at a distance. She read and studied her Bible daily. Her personal Bible had dozens of slips of paper tucked in the pages with lists of references for her study, like personal concordances. She truly walked a path of goodness.
