Psalm 29 The LORD gives strength to his people; the LORD blesses his people with peace. (v.11 NIV)

The Lord blesses his people with peace. Where might I find a word to bring me more comfort than the word peace? The dictionary describes peace as quiet, tranquility, calm, and serenity. Psalm 46:10 says, "Be still and know that I am God..." "Peace be with you," is often times used by Christians in parting.

At the church I attend, there's a mid-week service of "Nourishment & Healing." Thirty minutes to quiet our souls and rest our bodies in the middle of a sometimes tumultuous day. Along with a couple hymns, Scripture readings, and silent meditation, we confess our sins followed by Communion. As long as I am able, I will humbly kneel before my Lord at the kneeling rail. And, I admit it's easier to descend than to rise again. In the final portion of the service, we're invited to come for the anointing with oil for healing of body, mind, and soul.

We depart the sanctuary knowing we've been reconciled with God, and greet each other with signs of peace. "Peace be with you."

I know only God can repair the pain and hurt we hold onto. Please Lord, let there be no more resentment toward each other when words hurt. Let each of us rest in Your strength, trusting, and knowing You're in control.

will give him the throne of his father David, and he will reign over Jacob's descendants forever; his kingdom will never end." (vv.30-33)

"I know it sounds morbid to plan a funeral before he's passed away, but I'm a planner and always have been," my friend handed me the men's slacks to shorten. Her favorite uncle suffered a heart attack and lay in a coma at the hospital. My friend wanted to be sure her husband and three children possessed suitable attire for a funeral—just in case.

This got me thinking about God's plan for each of us. How does He control the lives of so many? Is he a *planner*? Does He make lists? Does He have a schedule for the plan He has for each of us? "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." (Jeremiah 29:11)

Hypocrisy. The last thing I want is to be labeled a hypocrite. I appear and profess to be a Christian in every way. However, the weeks of post-surgery recovery caused me to question my own obedience to God. My religious routine has been interrupted. Unable to attend church, women's Bible study, or mid-week service for nourishment and healing, I feel lost. I'm told it's normal to feel depressed following major surgery. But my early morning routine of coffee with God feels empty. After giving thanks for the new day, it's the prayer Jesus taught us to pray that gets me through the day. "Our Father in heaven, hollowed be thy name. Your Kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven" (Matthew 9:9, 10). I know then it's okay if I've no further words to pray out loud because God already knows my needs. He knows each thought and each prayer in my heart.

I chose to suffer the temporary pain of hip replacement so I could eventually live pain free. Recovery is difficult. Much harder than I expected. My biggest challenge besides the shower, is getting on and off the bed. My leg will not move of its own accord. As I try to will my leg to move, it appears to have a mind of its own as it lies heavy on the bed. "God is my strength," I repeat over and over.

It's then I think of our "Wounded Warriors." Unlike myself, they didn't choose to suffer pain—loss of limb or sight. They face challenges far greater than mine. Let us keep these brave warriors in our daily prayers. Pray for God to give them strength so they will know without a doubt God is their refuge and ever-

present help in all situations. Pray each day they're given strength for one small step toward recovery, knowing God's always there to help. And give thanks for the sacrifice they made for our freedom.
