

I am leaving tomorrow for continuing education in Pennsylvania.

The courses this term are "Philosophic and Patristic Theology" taught by Metropolitan Hierotheos Vlachos of Nafpaktos and "The Place of Psychology in Christian Ministry" taught by Dr. Renos Papadopolous.

It is an exhauting schedule of 3 class sessions per day each lasting 3.5 hours. The sessions consist of both lecture and seminar formats. Though, while exhausting physically, I have found myself mentally and spiritually energized at the end of each session.

One of the things that I enjoy about this program is the holistic approach it takes towards theological education. At United Theological (my MA in Theology) chapel was offered on Tuesday and Thursday each week. At Bexley Hall (M.Div) there was a Wednesday chapel service with the Lutherans, a Friday Eucharist, and Morning Prayer three times a week. In this program there is an understanding that doctoral level theological study and the prayers of the Church must be combined. In fact, a true theologian is first a person of prayer. In this program we begin and end the day with mandatory participation in Orthros (Morning Prayer) and Vigil (Evening Prayer) with the Divine Liturgy on Sundays and feasts. Each class session begins and ends with prayer as well. It is wonderful to study in a prayer filled and thoughtful environment with professors and mentors who

Readings & Music for May 21, 2017 Hymns: #518, #304, #448 The First Lesson Acts 17:22-31

Paul stood in front of the Areopagus and said, "Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, 'To an unknown god.' What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you. The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands, nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him-though indeed he is not far from each one of us. For 'In him we live and move and have our being'; as even some of your own poets have said, 'For we too are his offspring.'

Since we are God's offspring, we ought not to think that the deity is like gold, or silver, or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of mortals. While God has overlooked the times of human ignorance, now he commands all people everywhere to repent, because he has fixed a day on which he will have the world judged in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed, and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead."

The Epistle

1 Peter 3:13-22

Now who will harm you if you are eager to do what is good? But even if you do suffer for doing what is right, you are blessed. Do not fear what they fear, and do not be intimidated, but in your hearts sanctify Christ as Lord. Always be ready to make your defense to anyone who demands from you an accounting for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and reverence. Keep your conscience clear, so that, when you are maligned, those who abuse you for your good conduct in Christ may be put to shame. For it is better to suffer for doing good, if suffering should be God's will, than to suffer for doing evil. For Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring you to God. He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were saved through water. And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you-- not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him.

Jesus said, "If you love me, you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate, to be with you forever. This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him nor knows him. You know him, because he abides with you, and he will be in you.

"I will not leave you orphaned; I am coming to you. In a little while the world will no longer see me, but you will see me; because I live, you also will live. On that day you will know that I am in my Father, and you in me, and I in you. They who have my commandments and keep them are those who love me; and those who love me will be loved by my Father, and I will love them and reveal myself to them."
