Sunday, September 1

1 Kings 8:22-40 Then Solomon stood before the altar of the LORD in front of the entire community of Israel. He lifted his hands toward heaven, and he prayed. (vv.22-23a NLT)

I admit I have preconceived notions of what prayer should look and sound like. Here, it says Solomon was standing and his hands were lifted toward heaven. This picture looks a bit different from one who is seated with their head bowed and eyes closed, which is how I most often think of prayer.

The Bible is full of examples regarding prayer. Something that sticks out to me about this is the variety of postures, places and people who pray. There are private prayers and corporate prayers. Some are spoken loudly and some softly. Some involve weeping, and some are filled with happiness and joy.

When we pray, God is not concerned or interested in *how* we do it, but that we simply *do* it. We are free to cry out or be silent, open our eyes or close them, sit or stand, or pray alone or with others. How will you worship God through prayer today?

Mark 14:53-65 But Jesus was silent and made no reply. Then the high priest asked him, "Are you the Messiah, the Son of the Blessed One?" Jesus said, "I Am. And you will see the Son of Man seated in the place of power at God's right hand and coming on the clouds of heaven." (vv.61-62)

Jesus knew his time to be delivered over to death was at hand. He did not need to defend himself. He understood everything that was happening was fulfilling prophecy. He was confident that God would accomplish His plan concerning himself. He even declared, "I AM."

Psalm 28 Praise the LORD! For he has heard my cry for mercy. (v.6)

James 3:1-12 Sometimes it praises our Lord and Father, and sometimes it curses those who have been made in the image of God. And so blessing and cursing come pouring out of the same mouth. Surely, my brothers and sisters, this is not right! (vv.9-10)

My young grandson's ears are always listening, even when I don't think they are. If he hears me say the word "dumb" or "stupid," he quickly reminds me these are not kind words to say. Then, he urges me to use different words.

Like my grandson, the Holy Spirit also convicts me when I say or do things that are not pleasing to God. I get to choose. I can choose the way of the flesh or the way of the Spirit. I find when I slow down and think before I talk, it helps me to choose words wisely. Maybe that is why James also tells us to be quick to listen and slow to speak (1:19).
