Joshua 24:1-15 "But if you refuse to serve the LORD, then choose today whom you will serve. Would you prefer the gods your ancestors served beyond the Euphrates? Or will it be the gods of the Amorites in whose land you now live? But as for me and my family, we will serve the LORD." (v.15 NLT)

Like the Israelites in this passage, we are all faced with a choice. We must decide. We must choose. Are we going to live lives that reflect our culture and world? Are we going to live our lives in accordance with God's way and His word? These are age old questions. Joshua answers boldly and confidently.

Romans 16:1-16 Greet each other with a sacred kiss. All the churches of Christ send you their greetings. (v.16)

Tuesday, July 28

Psalm 62 O my people, trust in him at all times. Pour out your heart to him, for God is our refuge. (v.8)

Sometimes, for me, a good cry can do wonders. Most of the time I try to be positive and say encouraging things to myself and others. Unfortunately, this can carry over to my time with God in prayer. I'm aware God already knows how I feel and what I am thinking. Yet, sometimes, I'm not completely honest with myself or God.

God wants me to "pour" out my heart to Him. He actually wants my real feelings, thoughts, hurts, struggles—all of my heart—the good, the bad, the ugly. In the Hebrew, this verb "pour" is translated as the pouring out of a liquid offering. Instead of being something God doesn't want, He actually views my heart cries as an offering.

Now, I feel free to let go and pour out my innermost thoughts, feelings and struggles. Like the psalmist says, I can trust him. He is my refuge.

Wednesday, July 29

Judges 3:12-30 But when the people of Israel cried out to the LORD for help, the LORD again raised up a rescuer to save them. (v.15a)

God's character is seen in the passage we read in Judges. God's people were once again unfaithful and turned away from Him. And not only unfaithful, but the *New Living Translation* says they "did evil in the LORD's sight." They suffered enslavement for eighteen years before crying out to God to rescue them. Amazingly, when God hears the people call to Him for help, He hears, answers, and sends help.

The whole book of Judges is about this same cycle. The people turn from God, do evil, are enslaved, then call out to God for help. And every time, God in His faithfulness, delivers them. It is a picture of humanity. The cycle of sin and redemption leads up to the ultimate deliverer, Jesus.

I find great comfort in knowing that God is always faithful. Even when I am not. Even when I deliberately sin, He will rescue me. He simply waits for me to ask. Have you been suffering enslavement to something? A habit, addiction, or relationship? Cry out to God. He is faithful to deliver you.

Acts 1:15-26 Then they all prayed, "O Lord, you know every heart. Show us which of these men you have chosen." (v.24)

This passage makes the apostles' decision seem effortless! They simply ask. They even use the method of casting lots! I'm not thinking casting lots is very reliable for me. If only I could be more like them! I thank God for His word which shows us practical examples of ordinary people, living life and trusting God. What are you asking God for today?

Friday, July 31

Matthew 28:1-10 They were very frightened but also filled with great joy. (v.8b)

This is one of my favorite passages in the Bible. There is a quite a bit to digest in a short amount of verses. So much happens. There is an earthquake, a powerful angel, a giant stone rolled away, and soldiers fainting in fear. Then as you are running quickly from that scene, Jesus appears. That is a lot to take in! No wonder the women were afraid and filled with great joy.

I've learned to allow myself to feel them but not be ruled by them. I'm impressed that these women were able to face their fear and still move quickly as the angel and Jesus instructed them.
